The Committee were re-elected unanimously.

All the following items on the Agenda were voted on and confirmed unanimously;

The Subscription was kept at £25.00, the same amount as last year.

Duncan Robertson presented the accounts which show a small increase on last year's funds.

A cheque for £100.00 was presented during the meeting to the charity that the Harrow Hotel supports, the Roy Castle Fund, as thanks for the Harrow allowing us to use their upstairs room (see photo alongside).

Steven Borthwick presented the Nick Wales Shield to Keith Griggs because of all the work he has done to promote the Strut and the LAA, and his many charitable ventures (see also alongside).

Your Pilots' Licence is Changing!

"Change is the only constant." [Attributed to Heraclitus of Ephesus, 535-475 BCE)]

The CAA is looking at rationalising the administrative and legal pig's ear that is the current state of pilot licencing. ANO UK-PPL, Part-FCL, NPPL(A) and LAPL(A), all with different revalidation requirements, aircraft that can be flown, privileges and possible ratings.

Sounds good, but some changes might not be so for individual licence holders; the devil is in the detail. Flyer magazine have summarised the proposal here:
