Election of Office Bearers

Skyrora's visit in February

That was such a good talk given by Derek at the last Strut meeting. Skyrora are building a range of rockets in their factory near Edinburgh. The company will not only launch satellites but will also safely retrieve them from space for repair, repositioning or just clearing the void of the space rubbish that is accumulating, all while using their own rocket fuel made from otherwise unrecyclable plastic waste.

As for their technology, the 3D printing of their rocket motors has to be seen to be believed.

Engine testing happens nearby and Keith Griggs and Ed Lyon flew over to have a look at the site. Ed says;

'At our February Strut Meeting we had a superb presentation by Derek Harris of the Skyrora rocket launching system in development to launch low-orbit small satellites. The rocket launcher, Skyrora XL, is being developed in Scotland and testing of the main rocket engine is being done in a quarry to the south of Edinburgh. Towards the end of the presentation he said there was no objection to us flying over to take a look.

On Sunday 12th February weather was good so I went flying with Keith to have a look-see at the quarry. Keith had got the co-ordinates of N554643 and W0030250 which he entered on his SkyDemon so we headed straight there, staying below 2000ft as it's below the Edinburgh CTA. We did a false orbit around an industrial site near Gorebridge which had a stack of containers but then carried on until Keith suddenly spotted the quarry at Broad Law on a north-facing slope of the Moorfoot Hills. It really is quite impressive as it's so isolated yet behind us was the evergrowing urban sprawl of Edinburgh.

A couple of orbits for photographs then back home to East Fortune East. If you plan to also make a flying visit it's due south of Gorebridge then look out for the group of three wind turbines just to the south-east and to the west you can see Gladhouse reservoir.'


