The scheme provides two students with introductory flights and 10 hours flight training, as well as training materials, mentoring and membership to the British Microlight Aircraft Association. Pooleys generously donate the BMAA Microlight Starter Packs and the resident flying school, Adventure Aviation, provides the training.


